The Vape Store and More: Understanding the Legal Products Damaging the Mental Health of Your Patients

This session addresses the growing challenge of patients using substances that are legal but pose significant health risks. Attendees will gain evidence-based insight into commonly used products and their potential neurochemical and mental health consequences, with emphasis on effective patient communication to reduce harmful outcomes. Resistant Hypertension and Hypertensive Urgency

This high-yield session provides a practical framework for accurately diagnosing resistant hypertension and distinguishing it from pseudo-resistance, white coat hypertension, and masked hypertension. Attendees will learn a guideline-based, cost-effective and patient-centered approach to evaluating secondary causes of hypertension, along with step-by-step strategies for pharmacologic and nonpharmacologic management. The session also addresses the critical distinction between asymptomatic severe hypertension and true hypertensive emergencies, reviewing evidence-based approaches to reduce mismanagement, morbidity and mortality. Participants will leave with actionable strategies to improve diagnostic accuracy, treatment decisions and patient outcomes.

Attendees will explore emerging medication classes that have demonstrated improvements in morbidity and mortality, with discussion centered on practical application in clinical practice. Emphasis is placed on evidence-based decision-making to optimize outcomes for patients with heart failure.

Restoring Function in an Equestrian Athlete Through Osteopathic Manipulative Medicine: A Case Report

This interactive case-based session examines the osteopathic evaluation and management of equestrian-related injuries. Attendees will analyze patient history, chief concerns and differential diagnoses while exploring the biomechanics of horseback riding and related injury mechanisms. The session guides participants through osteopathic structural examinations, interpretation of findings and clinical reasoning used to select appropriate OMM techniques. Demonstrations of relevant techniques will be incorporated throughout, followed by audience discussion to reinforce the application of principles and answer participant questions.

Emphasis is placed on improving understanding, communication and decision-making in end-of-life care.

Reproductive Health Essentials for Osteopathic Clinicians: Practical Tools for Primary Care

This session provides osteopathic clinicians in primary care and obstetrics with practical, evidence-based approaches to common reproductive health presentations. Attendees will review clinic-ready frameworks for endocrine and cycle evaluation, including PCOS, thyroid disease, insulin resistance, obesity, irregular menses, and early pregnancy loss, as well as preconception optimization and early infertility triage for women and men. Assisted reproduction is discussed in the context of supporting expectation setting, high-quality referrals, and coordinated care, with an emphasis on clear orders, concise counseling, and timely access to specialty evaluation.

Clinical Applications of Artificial Intelligence: Decision Support, Remote Monitoring and Human-Centered Care Models

Xuewei Chen, Ph.D., M.Ed., MCHES; Simon Koch, Ph.D; Rangaprasad Sarangarajan, Ph.D; Vinoth Sittaramane Ph.D – SHSU

This evidence-driven workshop explores how artificial intelligence is being responsibly integrated into contemporary clinical practice. Attendees will examine AI-enabled remote patient monitoring for chronic disease management, assess the real-world capabilities and limitations of AI in medicine and review clinical decision support and diagnostic applications. The session also highlights human-centered AI and mobile health tools designed to improve communication, access and trust, particularly in rural settings.

Together, these perspectives provide a practical framework for evaluating and implementing AI across diverse clinical environments.

This session reviews current guideline-based management of vascular disease, with emphasis on coronary artery disease and peripheral artery disease. Attendees will examine recent evidence on long-term beta blocker use and explore antiplatelet strategies including monotherapy, dual antiplatelet therapy and dual pathway inhibition across relevant comorbidities.

All About Adult ADHD

This session addresses the evaluation and management of inattention in adult patients, with focus on the diagnostic challenges of adult ADHD. Attendees will review strategies to optimize assessment, differentiate ADHD from other conditions and approach treatment, including considerations for special populations where clinical decision-making is more complex.

#Health: The Physician's Guide to Social Media Medicine

This session explores the growing influence of social media on health information and clinical decision-making. Attendees will examine how algorithm-driven content and viral health claims shape patient beliefs, often outpacing scientific evidence. The discussion reviews selected high-visibility social media health trends, evaluates their clinical relevance and potential harms and addresses challenges physicians face when patients present with self-diagnoses formed online. Participants will develop practical communication strategies to counsel patients effectively, correct misinformation and support evidence-based care while maintaining trust and therapeutic rapport.

Using Bioethical Principles to Navigate the Texas Advance Directive Act

This session examines the bioethical principles underlying the Texas Advance Directives Act (TADA) and the changes introduced by HB 3162 in 2023. Attendees will explore the concept of medical futility, its role in medical decision-making and advance directives and the ethical challenges associated with its application. Practical guidance will be provided for evaluating cases involving medical futility and end-of-life care.

The Evolution of the Current Treatment for Open Neural Tube Defects and the Expanded Role for Primary Care

Session Descriptions

A.T. Still, Malaria, Medicine, Quinine and GOD

Daryl J. Callahan, DO – KansasCOM

This session examines the medical and philosophical journey of A.T. Still, founder of osteopathy, through his experiences with malaria and treatment with quinine during the mid-nineteenth century. Attendees will explore how limited understanding of parasitology and germ theory influenced Still's evolving views on medicine, spirituality and the musculoskeletal system, ultimately shaping the creation of osteopathy. The session also reviews current malaria epidemiology, pathophysiology, diagnosis, prevention and osteopathic treatment, highlighting Still's holistic legacy as a relevant and underutilized evidence-based model.

Doctor's First Aid Kit & Lightning Injuries

Robert C. Allen, DO, FACEP, Col (Ret) USAF MC CFS

This two-part session addresses preparedness for medical emergencies in both clinical and community settings. The first portion focuses on essential physician first aid kits, emphasizing advanced bleeding control techniques such as tourniquets, wound packing and battle dressings, along with immediate access to medications for anaphylaxis. The second portion examines lightning injuries, covering the physics and physiology of lightning strikes, immediate treatment considerations and strategies to reduce risk and improve patient safety.

Force of Habit: Approach to Thoughtful Discussions about Wellness in Children and Teens

Lesley Gardiner, MD, PhD, FAAP; Natasha Shah, MD, FAAP – SHSU-COM

This session addresses the challenges of discussing wellness with children, teens and families amid widespread misinformation and social media influence. Attendees will examine trends driving the rise in chronic conditions such as childhood obesity and eating disorders and review current wellness recommendations. The discussion focuses on practical techniques for thoughtful, preventive conversations about healthy habits and strategies to overcome common barriers, supporting long-term pediatric health and improved patient engagement.

Getting Paid: Mastering Defensible Documentation

Cynthia Penkala, CMM, FACMPE – American Osteopathic Association

This session focuses on improving clinical documentation to support appropriate reimbursement. Attendees will learn how an enhanced SOAP note structure can strengthen defensibility, reduce payer denials and help ensure payment for services provided.

High Reliability Medicine: What Healthcare Can Learn From TOPGUN

Kris M. Belland, DO, MPH, MBA, MSS, CPE – Aerospace Medicine Strategic Consultation (AMSC), PLLC

This session connects osteopathic philosophy with proven safety practices from high-reliability organizations such as naval aviation, where errors are anticipated, identified early and mitigated before harm occurs. Attendees will explore how principles of whole-person care, systems thinking and environment align with strategies including crew resource management, standardization and brief-debrief culture. Drawing on aviation safety models, the session examines why preventable harm persists in healthcare and how osteopathic physicians are uniquely positioned to lead high-reliability transformation that improves outcomes, strengthens teams and reduces burnout.

How to Succeed in a Clerkship

Ava Stanczak, DO, FACOP – SHSU-COM

This session offers practical guidance to enhance the clerkship experience, with strategies for setting expectations, navigating challenges and avoiding common pitfalls.

Human Trafficking: Training for Healthcare Professionals (HUMAN TRAFFICKING)

Muriel Lanford, MSN, RN, TCRN – Ransomed Life of Texas

This session provides healthcare professionals with essential knowledge about human trafficking (HT), including key facts and common misconceptions. Attendees will learn how to recognize indicators and deliver appropriate, patient-centered responses across practice settings. This presentation is a State of Texas-approved Human Trafficking course for healthcare practitioners.

Low Back Pain - Always Be More Specific

Sujan Gogu, DO, FAAFP – DHR Health

This session equips clinicians with practical strategies to evaluate and treat low back pain using an anatomy-based, evidence-driven approach. Attendees will review accurate diagnosis, appropriate imaging and identification of red flags, along with effective conservative and interventional management options. Practical cases highlight the roles of physical therapy, osteopathic manipulative treatment and emerging therapies designed to improve patient outcomes.

Skin Cancer Detection and Office-Based Management: An Update for Busy Physicians

Rick Lin, DO, MPH, FAOCD – South Texas Dermatology

This case-based session equips busy clinicians with practical strategies to recognize, biopsy and manage common skin cancers within typical clinic time constraints. Attendees will review key clinical patterns for melanoma, basal cell carcinoma, squamous cell carcinoma and actinic keratoses, along with guidance on when to biopsy, monitor or refer. The session also covers streamlined biopsy techniques, basic margin considerations and appropriate follow-up strategies suitable for office-based practice.

The Osteopathic Elevator Pitch

Carol Browne, DO, FACOPF – UIW-SOM

This session explores the history and evolution of osteopathic medicine through the lens of A.T. Still's original vision. Attendees will examine how osteopathy has developed into modern osteopathic medicine and reflect on what it means to be an osteopathic physician today. The session includes guided activities to help participants craft a clear and meaningful elevator pitch, followed by small-group and large-group discussions to share perspectives and strengthen professional identity.

To Code or Not to Code: That is the Question!

Martha L. Danhof, DO, FACP – Texas Health Resources: Hurst Euless Bedford

This session reviews ethical considerations surrounding code status and advance directives, including common misconceptions about DNR orders and advance care planning. Attendees will examine decision-making related to limited and full code options, review survival outcomes and explore the principles of beneficence and non-maleficence in CPR. The session also covers the appropriate use and completion of MOST and DNR forms.

When Things Go Wrong: Handling Adverse Events and Navigating the Legal System (ETHICS/RISK)

Mr. Jeffrey A. Woods, JD – SVMIC

The purpose of this session is to identify the most common risk issues presented following an adverse medical event that can lead to a claim or lawsuit. It will discuss the legal and ethical requirements as well as practical ways to decrease the likelihood of a claim or lawsuit. Finally, it will provide an overview of the litigation process including the elements of a medical malpractice lawsuit and each of the major phases.
